Paoli Library is open to the public:


- Monday & Wednesday: 9:30 am 5 pm




Circulation



Adult Programming (Submitted by Marianne Hooper)

Attendance at adult programs has been growing. In addition to the ongoing programs (yoga, meditation, ukulele, etc.) and the six different book groups, there were 10 individual programs in January as well as 12 programs in February and 16 planned for March.

In January, over 80 people attended each of the two Classical Music concerts. We also welcomed Ben Franklin (Mike Kochen) who talked about his life and his experiments to an audience of 65 in a hybrid setting. Our monthly genealogy talks in partnership with the Main Line Genealogy Club regularly draw between 60 and 80 attendees also in a hybrid format.

Among the February programs are two author talks – Greg Nobles and Pam Jenoff. There are three Black History programs: Enslaved at Oakley; the poetry of Langston Hughes and Gwendolyn Brooks; and "Meet Ned Hector," a Black Revolutionary War Soldier. We are also showing the films Black Panther and Wakanda Forever for the regular film series.

On March 19, we will be welcoming Martha Washington (Amanda Carey) for women's history month, and we are partnering with Main Line Health for a seminar in end of life care. Other programs include a talk on the Treasures of the Philadelphia Museum of Art, and the curator of the North American Collection at the Penn Museum who will be highlighting some of the Native American Collection there.



Children's Programming (Submitted by Stephanie Bragg)

We've had a great beginning to 2023! Recently a new position was added to our department with the help of the Reference Department, Children's Reference Assistant. This position will provide reference help to our younger patrons and help with programming. We are very excited to have Amy Moscia in this position.

So far from the beginning of the year we have held over 50 programs and Grab & Go kits with over 1000 participants. Some program highlights:

- Consistently robust weekly storytime attendance
- A super fun pizza party storytime
- A checkout challenge! For every book checked out patrons are offered a white sticker (a snowball) to place on our cardboard cutout of Captain America. The goal is to completely cover him before the end of the month. Almost 1000 stickers have been placed so far. We are well on our way!
- A new session of Framed and Framed+
