Interim Director's Report to the Library Board of Trustees April 27, 2023

Operations

We continue to experience turnover and continue hiring for part-time staff positions in order to increase operating hours at Tredyffrin Public Library.

Tredyffrin Public Library is open to the public:

• Monday – Thursday 10 am – 7 pm

• Friday – Saturday 10 am – 5 pm

• Sunday 1 pm – 5pm

Paoli Library is open to the public:

Monday & Wednesday: 9:30 am – 5 pm

• Tuesday & Thursday: 9:30 am – 7 pm

Friday & Saturday: 9:30 am – 5 pm

Work on the HVAC at Tredyffrin Public Library has begun. The Township is coordinating the work with the contractors.


Tredyffrin Library was closed on April 6, 2023, due to lack of air conditioning. This outage was related to the HVAC renovation work. The township coordinated with the HVAC contractor and service was partially restored and the library reopened the following day. Contractors have discovered additional issues with HVAC system components and are working with the township to mitigate the issues. A temporary unit is being put in place to assist with the air conditioning issues until a new unit can be installed. (See pictures at the end of the report).

Work on the roof is scheduled to begin Monday May 8th. The township will be closing off the majority of the lower parking lot for construction vehicles and supplies.

For the month of March, 13,573 library visits were recorded. Compared to March 2022, the visitor count increased by 6,270.




Circulation


