

Director's Report to the Library Board of Trustees June 22, 2023

Operations

I am beginning to observe the operating hours at both Tredyffrin and Paoli. I spent a week at Paoli in early June to get a better feel for it and plan on spending at least a day there each week for the foreseeable future.

Monday – Thursday 10 am – 7 pm

• Friday – Saturday 10 am – 5 pm

Sunday 1 pm – 5pm

Paoli Library is open to the public:

Monday & Wednesday: 9:30 am – 5 pm

Tuesday & Thursday: 9:30 am – 7 pm

Friday & Saturday: 9:30 am – 5 pm

Work on the HVAC at Tredyffrin Public Library continues. The Township is coordinating the work with the contractors. The HVAC company was also out Thursday, May 25 to change the filters. After the rain on Monday, June 12, there were some leaks within the building and it was realized that there was 6 inches of standing water in the HVAC well on the roof. The pumps that are supposed to be in there are also missing.


Work on the roof officially began Wednesday, May 24th and continues. To date, no mold has been found. Update from Dave Duda, the project manager, is below.

"We just wrapped up our progress meeting for the library. I'm happy to report that Houder has installed sump pumps to help temporality reduce water in the swimming pool. Hirschberg will be onsite tomorrow with their line jetter to re-open the 4 drains that have filled up with construction debris. Short of the long story is............... I do not anticipate any more indoor rain events from here on out! Houder will be onsite concurrently until the project is finished. We are about 75% completed with the steel work. Decking should start tomorrow and finish next week. This is the "roof" over the swimming pool to make it flat with the existing roof. The TPO "roof membrane" will also start next week. This will be one of the highest noise producing parts of the project unfortunately. With this, please plan accordingly. We are still lightyears away from a realistic timeframe for the a/c chiller that needed to be replaced. the manufacture has been tight lipped on this. My intuition is that it will be Winter or spring of 2024."

Building Access

For the month of May, 12,940 library visits were recorded. Compared to May 2022, the visitor count increased by 4,173.



Circulation





We had a successful first half of the year with our many library partners. Some of them take the summer off from meetings including Sisters in Crime, Main Line Genealogy, Camerata Philadelphia, SCORE, and the TE Historical Society. Regular programs that will continue throughout the summer include yoga, ukulele, ESL, Medicare workshops, Connecting Club, and our book clubs.

This Summer we are renewing our partnership with the Valley Forge Alliance to provide a series of six Lunch and Learn programs in June and July. Also, we are once again teaming up with Jenkins Arboretum to sponsor Arbo-READ-um. There are a series of reading and activity challenges on Beanstack as well as three programs: two with author Maria Rodale and another with Mark Highland of Organic Mechanics about having healthy soil for your garden.

The Adult Summer Reading program kicked off on Friday, June 16 along with the children's program launch. Adults have an opportunity to play Library Bingo on Beanstack (or on paper if they would rather) to win prizes including passes to Longwood Gardens, gift certificates to Main Point Books, and more. In addition, there a number of individual programs including a "Community Conversation on Book Bans," a program on cover letters and resumes, and some author talks.

The Fall schedule is already in the works with dates for a number of programs already on the calendar. Please mark your calendars for Saturday, October 14 for the annual Party in the Park where the library will have multiple tables promoting the library. In the past, the Library Board has also had a table and may want to consider that for this year.

I would like to recognize the many staff members who have provided program ideas, and especially to those who have stepped up and headed up various programs including Jonathan Trice, Sam Sorenson, Carla Vastine, and Lisa Baron.

Just a couple of weeks until summer begins! We are finalizing the reading log, updating LibCal with summer programs, and gathering the prizes. Our kick off party is June 16th at 4PM and it ends of August 11th. During the course of the summer we will have in house programs put on by children's department staff, including a STEAM week. There were nine graduating seniors in this years' internship; they spent a month at the library learning all aspects of the operation from technical services, to customer service, to our core values, to community programming. A few highlights were: "The Journey of the Book," training with Saj Bewtra, reading and discussing, "Protocol: The Power of Diplomacy and How to Make It Work for You," business lunches with Sam Bewtra, two sessions on time management with college expert and reference librarian, Carla Vastine, and training to tell stories with Stephanie and Michele in the Children's department.
