Director's Report to the Library Board of Trustees July 27, 2023

Operations

I spend at least a day at Paoli each week observing library observations. So far each library's hours seem to be sufficient for the public's needs. What we're considering and evaluating now is the one-desk model for reference. With the possible upgrades of the inside of the library, this would move the reference staff to the circulation desk, eliminating the need for a separate desk.

Tredyffrin Public Library is open to the public:

Monday – Thursday 10 am – 7 pm

• Friday – Saturday 10 am – 5 pm

Sunday 1 pm – 5pm

Paoli Library is open to the public:

Monday & Wednesday: 9:30 am – 5 pm

Tuesday & Thursday: 9:30 am – 7 pm

• Friday & Saturday: 9:30 am – 5 pm

Work on the HVAC at Tredyffrin Public Library continues. The Township is coordinating the work with the contractors, but I believe at this point, there is no work to be done until the part that is needed arrives – which isn't expected until 2024.

Work on the roof officially began Wednesday, May 24th and continues. To date, no mold has been found. Most current update (7/17) from Dave Duda, the project manager, is below.

"As you most likely know by this point, the library faced some water damage from the last rainstorm. The sunken area of the library collected a significant amount of rainfall that could not be evacuated efficiently. This led to major leaks in the entrance of the library. Once on site it was clearly visible that the contractor didn't fully glue down certain areas of the roof, thus creating areas of water to enter. It was also visible that the sump pumps had been blocked by debris and were not functioning properly.

We made the decision to call ServePro to mitigate the problems with the water. At this time, I can say all the water damage has been resolved. The drywall will remain un-repaired until the end of the project. This allows us visibility if more leaking would occur while not having to replace more drywall. The leaks overall were a mistake by the contractor.

The good news is that the sumped area has passed final inspection and is 100% completed. This means that hopefully Darin and myself have no more weekend trips down there for water issues. Focus now will move to the remaining roof for construction work. Schedule is on time at this point, even with the rain."

In my two months and 10 days here at Tredyffrin Township Libraries, my early observations are that staffing and programming are two incredible strengths that Tredyffrin Library has. The staff work

incredibly well together in general as well as on planning programming for the public. When I found out that the library won the Vattemare Award for Creativity in Libraries I was floored. I realize that libraries win things all the time but I've never been at a library that had the staff time to even apply for such a thing and it's such an amazing feeling being somewhere such as this. Chester County in general has been wonderful, and Chester County Library System has been great in helping me get my sea legs as director. There is so much going on it is hard to keep track of it all, and just Monday, I discovered that as part of the STEAM camp in the children's department they learned about budgeting (for the real world)! I shared the Facebook post to my own page and everyone thought it was absolutely the best thing.

In terms of things that can improve, clearly, there are building issues, and we're working on that in partnership with the Township – again – something I'm not used to going so smoothly. I can only hope that our request for Capital funds in 2024 for an overhaul of our library's "innards" will be approved so that not only are we doing amazing things but our building is welcoming and useful for what our community needs it to be.


Last, we're writing up a job description for a PT PR/Marketing assistant to help streamline the processes of marketing the library in terms of social media, the website, etc. This hire would work closely with multiple staff, especially Rachel.

In terms of the patron concern at Paoli, she has not returned and we hope that our letter has made her realize that her behavior was completely unacceptable for the library.

Building Access

For the month of June, 13,418 library visits were recorded. Compared to July 2022, the visitor count increased by 2,310. The door count will be slightly off due to the lobby closure after the rain inside the building. With the ceiling tiles having to be torn down, we also had to remove the lobby's door counter. CCLS will re-install next week.



Circulation





It's the middle of summer learning and we are rolling! As of 7/19 we have 457 signed up for our program. We have had many returning to the summer learning table every day to receive their raffle tickets, participating in the guessing jar, and choosing a free book.

For programs in the month of June we had over 750 participants in programs varying from self-directed learning (with take home kits & library scavenger hunts) to storytimes as well as active programs (bristlebots & pre-k mindfulness).
