

Director's Report to the Library Board of Trustees September 28, 2023

Operations

Work on the HVAC at Tredyffrin Public Library continues. The Township is coordinating the work with the contractors, but I believe at this point, there is no work to be done until the part that is needed arrives – which isn't expected until 2024.

Work on the roof is officially finished! The contractors began work on fixing the lobby and the small part of the wall in the King room on Monday 9/18 and it is supposed to be completed within a week. The cost of the work is being covered by the contractor.

We are still waiting on the part for the HVAC unit in the King room, but temperatures have been relatively cool lately so it's not problematic. Word on the street is that our 70-ton chiller may arrive in February, 2024 – but I will not be holding my breath. Will continue to provide monthly updates.

The computer lab is getting painted Tuesday, 9/26 for the MakerSpace! We're so excited about this amazing new adventure we're going on.


FT staff evaluations are complete and approved by Casey at the Township and I will work on meeting with each person to review them.



Circulation





Adult Programming Report
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Summer wrapped up with the Novel Tea Fundraiser. Tredyffrin Library sold 10 books, and we were the only library to host an in person watch party. We had snacks and a lively discussion as we watched Pam Jenoff on Zoom. We kicked off September with a program on the Women Justices of the Supreme Court which was held at St. Luke's Church due to the lack of air conditioning in the King Room. In September, there were two author programs with Erin Reilly and John Dobbyn. The Great Books group is meeting back in the library post-covid and is doing a Zoom hybrid format which was very successful; the Residential Rain Garden Program was well attended by a very engaged group, and will be followed up by a tour of local rain gardens. Camerata and Genealogy, two of our most popular programs, have started up again after the summer break and routinely draw 60-80 attendees. The library's first Pride in the Park event is scheduled for Sunday September 24. A new community partnership for programs has been established with the Wayne Senior Center, which is offering tech programs and a caregiver support group. Another new partnership is with Choosing Change Counseling in Wayne which is providing programming on a variety of mental and family health issues and resources. Chester County CareerLink will now be coming to the library once per month for outreach to provide free resume and job search resources for residents.

Well it's back to school time! We planned a lot of programs this month to keep the momentum from this summer. We've had 16 programs so far this month in addition to our regular storytimes. The scavenger hunts through the department continue to be super popular with kiddos coming back multiple times to complete the hunt. They love it!

October also brings the return of Trunk or Treat! We had a blast last year and looking forward to it! Teens in August held our monthly events including: board game and cards night, Nintendo Switch on the big screen afterschool, teen book groups, monthly mystery event, chess, anime, and our Roundtable Discussion Dinner.

Our camp that began in July was ongoing. Ten summers ago, we set out to create a performing arts camp that emphasized community and ensemble rather than competition—something affordable, flexible and accessible to all families and schedules. This year we welcomed a new teaching artist Haley Phares. Our accompanist Maria Dell'Orefice stepped into the role of teaching artist.

Haley Phares is an actress and singer who performed onstage at Conestoga High School. Her favorite role was working in the ensemble for "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat." She practiced voice with the Kate Mallon-Day Voice Studio for all four years of high school and is currently pursuing a BA from West Chester University of Pennsylvania in Music Therapy; her major instrument is voice. She believes in the promise of music to improve emotional and physical well-being and is passionate about the inclusivity of music and theatre.

Maria Dell'Orefice, a classical pianist and avid violinist, has shared the stage with a multitude of performers including Alexander Markov, Francesca DePasquale and Chris Botti. While Maria frequently presents solo and collaborative performances in the Philadelphia area, she has also performed solo piano in Carnegie Hall's Weill Recital Hall as a result of winning the Semper Pro Musica Competition, Elite International Music Competition, and Crescendo International Piano Competition. Maria recently returned from a program in Mondavio, Italy in which she accompanied opera singers in Mozart's *Don Giovanni*. She was the musical director for the Delaware Valley Opera Company in July 2023 for their productions of *Goyescas* and *Abu Hassan*.

Both Maria and Haley are Conestoga High School graduates.

Our Remixed Classics program is ongoing.

We continued to host a teen for the summer who is interning in Library Science. The internship is similar to our spring internship and covers many aspects of professional librarianship.
