# **Operations**

"Once we have consistent spring weather, the chiller will get turned on." Well, now we wait. Spring has sprung, and it was incredibly warm in the library last week with the uptick in temperature. However, there are many moving parts to getting the chiller up and running and it's more than just pushing an on button. I am hopeful that it will be on and running soon before we have consistently *very warm* weather.

And our next issue...our green roof was leaking but it seems to have stopped. The township has been out to look at it and has found a new company that deals in green roofs so that we can make sure everything is A-OK (and my office isn't drippy anymore). The contractor recommends they get all of the cracks and seams in the stucco that are visible by the green roof sealed. They will also be sending out a roofer to dig down into the green roof to investigate the membrane.

Beverly is back to her post at Paoli! We're so glad to have her back.

We are considering applying for an LSTA grant but the turnaround time is very quick (due May 15<sup>th</sup>).



# Circulation





### Adult Programming (submitted by Sam Sorensen):

In March, Tredyffrin saw over one thousand patrons for adult programs!

Our most attended events were the Vintage & Handmade Market with 125 patrons and the SEPTA Senior Key Card Sign Up with 242 patrons. Michele Bolay, our Children's Programming and Admin staff member, and I are considering another market in November for the holiday season. The SEPTA event was a collaboration between the library, Rep. Melissa Shusterman's office, and Senator Carolyn Comitta's office. Their offices were very pleased with the turnout, stating that this event was more successful than all of their recent events. We received calls from patrons asking if it was possible to sign up if they lived outside of Chester county, and the staff from both offices confirmed that as long as the attendees lived in Pennsylvania, they would assist them. I raise this detail because many from the area who may not be Chester county residents still consider our library an important resource. Because of the overwhelming response, I coordinated additional sign-up dates with Rep. Shusterman's office to increase accessibility with parking and wait times. The next event is scheduled for June 11.

I have also been working closely with Amy Mosica, our Makerspace Coordinator, to host more intergenerational programming. We held an event on March 10, Mario Day, and we had 220 attendees. We are planning more programs out of the Makerspace that allow intergenerational connection. We are also planning Makerspace programs specifically for seniors and working with local service organizations to publicize them more widely.

Looking ahead, we will be starting up a weekly Mah Jongg program (Tuesdays from 11am until 1pm) based on a lot of requests from the community. I also received program details for the Lunch & Learn series we run with Valley Forge Park Alliance that will begin on June 6. I am working on completing the Beanstack challenges for Arbo-READ-um, curating materials for People's Light's lobby and writing copy for their display, locking in programming for Pride month in June, and designing the passport challenges, scheduling thematically aligned programs, and sourcing prizes for adult summer reading.



### Children's Programming (Submitted by Stephanie Bragg)

The children's department was hoppin' in March! We had our usual widely attended storytimes, fantastic art programs, and tech time in the makerspace. Plant Club got started by planting their starter seeds. Plant Club continues in April Homemade Bug Hotels. For the preschool crowd we had Preschool STEM where the littles used paint laced with baking soda and vinegar to make Fizzy Painted Shamrocks and grow rainbows using absorption. And in the Makerspace we introduced digital art through the Procreate app and tried to stop the Pigeon from driving the Spheros. Miss Amy has also started a crochet club for 4th-6th graders, all skill levels welcome!

The Children's Department is planning for summer! The theme is Adventure Begins at Your Library. Last summer we welcomed 500 registrations and expect this year to be the same. Each child registered will receive a summer learning passport with a reading challenge, some summer learning activities and more. We are even adding a new age group in partnership with the teen department. We are looping 7th & 8th graders in. There will be a Pre-K to 4th Grade passport and a 5th to 8th Grade passport. Registration will be at the summer reading table manned by our awesome summer teen volunteers. We have planned STEAM Week (which replaces Science in the Summer) for the middle of July and are looking forward to some excellent external educators to come in with fun and engaging activities.

# Teen Programming (Submitted by Laurie Doan)

Teens in March held our monthly events including: board game and cards night, teen book groups, weekly crochet club, anime, Switch on the big screen, chess, and our Roundtable Discussion Dinner.

Teen Librarian, Laurie Doan is enrolled in Computational Thinking as part of Transforming Teen Services, an initiative of the Young Adult Library Services Association in partnership with Chief Officers of State Library Agencies, funded by the Institute of Museum and Library Services.

The teen librarian attended three school musicals and two ARCH presentations in the district. Also offsite was an event at the McKaig Nature Center where teens unleashed their inner explorers and embarked on a night hike to find the "Missing McKaig Pot of Gold." After our successful quest, we gathered around a warm bonfire for classic s'mores and shared our discoveries with fellow adventurers.

March marked the beginning of our 5-week course Introduction to Python with Aarav. The course covers: Introduction and Installing Python & VS Code, Data Structures (Lists, Sets, Dictionaries etc), Control Flow (If, Else, Elseif, Loops), Functions and its uses, File Management, and Game Development using Python.

Our Remixed Classics program is ongoing.
